NEW SIGNINGS

It is always a little difficult at this early stage of the season in saying a lot on this subject, but those names that have, prior to this programme being printed, should certainly add a good deal of all round strength to the Club.

Tony Claypole, who has played some 140 first team games for Northampton Town is expected to obtain the necessary permit to play, and one would hope, with this experience, that he will prove to be a great asset.

Paul Gazzard who has been away for the last two seasons, on a teachers' training course, has returned to the town to take up a local position, and we would expect him to be contesting a first team place.

Gary Howells has joined us from Porthleven. This player has been with us before and we all know what a powerful defender he can be.

Malcolm Lock is a natural left winger and goalscorer, he should add that extra punch required in the forward line.

Geoff Freeman has been out of the game for a while following an interest in athletics, and hopes that he will be able to recapture his old County form in making his return to football.

Several younger players have signed for the Second and Third Teams, and to all our players, new and old, we wish them every success this season.

PROSPECTS 1972-1973

We do indeed look forward to a successful season for our three sides, we finished Seventh, Sixth and Fourth in the respective Leagues, and with the potential we have available look for all round improvement. Manager Dave Wadd certainly expects to achieve a place in the first four in the South Western League, and hopes this team will boast at least one trophy at the end of the season. The Second team's achievements will depend on First team requirements, but it is felt that the players, all of whom are obviously second strings, should prove this in attaining a high league position and perhaps the return of the League Cup. The Third side will emphasize 'Youth.' A must if looking to the local talent for the future of football. Every encouragement will be given them in the up-grading to second and first team football. Managers and Club prestige, as we well know, survive on successful team results. Dave puts everything into training and coaching, sweating it out with the players—a dedicated man to say the least—success or failure, he can only do so much, the remainder is up to the players themselves on his behalf. If they adopted his attitude to the game we would without doubt achieve the necessary all round improvement. One must realise that it is difficult to maintain consistency in the players and teams, off days are inevitable, the bounce of the ball, which has been somewhat against us in the past, adds to the players frustration, and this tends to lead to the team becoming disjointed. It is always easy from the touchline, everyone should learn from this—being wiser after the event—but many of the players are young and experience and knowledge of the game is only gained by playing and learning from those mistakes made. We are, after all, 'Amateurs'—the best of professionals make mistakes. A certain amount of patience, effort and encouragement would be greatly appreciated from those concerned in respect of the three sides. With this, success, we are sure, can be ours.

We drew a lot of prestige from the following first team results last season, drawing with the League Champions, Falmouth Town, and winning against Bodmin, Wadebridge, Newquay and Holsworthy, all of whom finished above us in the League. St. Austell was the only side we failed to take a point from. We have proved we are quite capable in winning against the better teams and therefore look forward confidently to a successful season.

BOB PAXTON

Bob Paxton took up residence at Carbis Bay earlier this year, moving from Rugby, where he was Hon. General Secretary for some six years. With the vast experience gained there he is obviously going to be a great asset to the administration side of the Club, and it is envisaged that there is a possibility of him assuming my duties—this would depend on my own ability in managing the Second XI successfully this season—but I do indeed look forward to working and sharing my duties with him. It will make my job much easier and should assure the Club of smooth and efficient administration.



CRYSTAL PALACE ELEVEN

TERENCE AUSTIN—Our latest professional, played in our Junior Side as an Amateur for the last two seasons, scoring 17 goals during last year's matches. We have great hopes that Terry will become a good prospect in the future.

MICHAEL BROWN (Welsh Youth International)—Signed Apprentice in August, 1968, and professional in September, 1969. He was a member of the Welsh Youth team that beat England in the 1970 International Youth Tournament, gaining 4 Youth Caps in all. Now almost 21 he plays centre half and has been an ever present in the Reserve Team.

JIM CANNON (Scottish Youth International)—Signed professional after 15 months as an apprentice. Captained our under 17 Juniors who did the double in Season 1970/71. Played for the Scottish Youth XI against the Scottish U.23 team and also represented Scotland in the Little World Cup in Spain which England won.

NICKY CHATTERTON—Served as an Amateur while on our ground staff. Signed Apprentice in 1969 and was one of our recent professional signings. He has played for Surrey Youth, and had a good tour in the Viareggio Tournament under 21's. He scored 15 goals in our Junior side last season, has played in our Reserve XI and is a very versatile player.

BOB GOLDTHORPE—Bob is one of the stalwarts of the Reserve side, having made 33 appearances in the League and 3 in the London Challenge Cup. He made one appearance in the first XI, having a good game against West Bromwich Albion.

PAUL HAMMOND—Signed as a professional in January, 1971 and has proved himself to be a reliable goalkeeper. He was elected "Player of the Tournament" when Palace Juniors played in Roubaix, France and has made 40 appearances in the reserve side during the last season.

MARTIN HINSELWOOD—Martin is a product of the Palace Youth team, having played for Croydon and Surrey Schools before signing as an apprentice in November, 1969. Became a professional in August, 1970 and had a most successful season.

ROSS JENKINS—Unusually tall for an inside-forward. Played for Richmond and London Schools before signing apprentice for Palace in July 1968 and professional in November, 1969. He made his debut as a first team player against Manchester United in September, 1971 and in all made 5 appearances for the first XI.

BRIAN KEY—A very recent signing, only having signed on the 20th May, 1972 as a professional, having previously been an Amateur from the 7th March. Is a very promising player and has been loaned to Germiston Callies in South Africa for the summer to gain experience. Scored 6 goals last season.

DAVID MANN—Signed Apprentice in July, 1968 and turned professional in July, 1970. As a schoolboy he played for Hounslow Schools and became a product of our Youth scheme. Was an ever present last season in the Reserve side, making 27 appearances in league and cup matches.

ROGER MAUGHAN—Having signed as an apprentice in August, 1970, Roger turned professional in March this year. Made 28 appearances in our Junior sides and although he only scored 4 goals he is a bright prospect for the future.

ANDY McBRIDE—Joined us as an Apprentice in July, 1970 straight from school and stepped up as a full professional in October 1971. Was an ever present in our Junior side last season, making in all 45 appearances. Was also a member of the party which went to Viareggio.

DES McCARTHY—Joined us as an Apprentice in July, 1970 and is one of our recent signings as a pro., having completed his forms in March, 1972. Appeared in almost all our Junior side matches playing mostly in defence. Was also a member of the party to tour Italy.

GRAHAM NORRIS—Represented the Surrey Youth team and made his reserve team debut in May, 1971, having signed apprentice in January of that year. He turned professional in February, 1972. Was a regular member of our Junior side last season and made 3 appearances in the reserve XI during the season.

VIC PAIN—Played for South London and Surrey Schoolboys in addition to the London Youth team, is a regular in our reserve team having scored 8 goals last season. Was a member of the squad which went to Italy. Served with us as an apprentice from April, 1970 and turned professional the following year.

MICHAEL PARKER—Joined us as an Apprentice in July, 1970 on leaving school, and signed as a professional in October, 1971. Is a regular member of our Junior team, missing only one match last season, during which time he scored six goals.

ALAN PINKNEY—Locally born, Alan was a former amateur with Palace before taking up college studies, during which time he played several games for Exeter City including a cup tie against Manchester United. Signed professional in July, 1969 and has made 30 appearances in our Reserve Side, being our leading scorer last season with 15 goals.

LEN PRINCE—Signed as an apprentice in July, 1970 and almost exactly a year later turned professional. Len is also an ever present in our Junior team, appearing all but once during last season and made two appearances with our reserve side.

BILL ROFFEY—Represented South London Schools before signing apprentice in April, 1970 and then professional in May, 1971. Plays regularly in our Reserve Side and made 26 appearances for them last season. Bill has made great strides during the past season and it is hoped he will soon be challenging for a first team place.

GRAHAM THOMAS—As a schoolboy played for Hastings and Eastbourne Schools and on a number of occasions for Eastbourne Town in the Athenian League. Graham signed apprentice in July, 1969 and then in August, 1970 signed professional forms. Is one of our stalwarts in the reserve team, making 34 appearances last season, scoring 7 goals.

GARRY TOWSE—Joined us in December, 1971 as an Amateur, when he was playing for Folkstone Town in the Southern League. As a boy represented Folkstone and Kent Schools. Garry signed professional forms with us in January, 1972, but unfortunately due to a motor car accident was only able to make one appearance for us last season.

KEITH WALLEY—As one of our younger players, signed apprentice in July, 1970 and professional in March, 1972, playing in our Junior team last season he appeared 19 times. Has been a member of our team when they have toured abroad.

HARRY WATSON—Again one of our younger players who signed as an apprentice in May, 1971. Harry is a member of our Junior side and whom we hope will prove a prospect for the seniors when he is older.

DAVID SWINDLEHURST—David was one of our schoolboys and in November, 1971 signed as an Apprentice. Played in our Junior teams, making 25 appearances, scoring 5 goals. Is still extremely young but already stands 6 foot high.

OFFICIALS

ERNEST WALLEY—(Trainer/Coach)—Has been with the Club since 1969, until last year was Youth team manager, then became trainer coach to the Second XI. Prior to his appointment at Crystal Palace he was with Arsenal for six years in that capacity with the youth side. His playing career of ten years, was two years with Middlesbrough and eight years with Tottenham Hotspurs.

PETER BARNES—(Assistant Secretary)—Has also been with the Club since 1969 following Palace's promotion to the First Division.
